

# Conditionals

Conditionals describe situations and their possible outcomes. There are four types: zero, first, second, and third conditionals. Each serves a different purpose and follows specific grammatical rules.

---

## 1. Zero Conditional

Usage: Describes general truths or facts that are always true.

Structure: If + present simple, present simple.

### Examples:

If you heat water to 100°C, it boils.

If you mix red and blue, you get purple.

If the sun sets, it gets dark.

If it rains, the ground gets wet.

If you don't water plants, they die.

If you press this button, the light turns on.

If you eat too much sugar, you gain weight.

If you touch fire, it burns you.

If students work hard, they succeed.

If iron is exposed to water, it rusts.

## 2. First Conditional

Usage: Describes real or likely situations in the future.

Structure: If + present simple, will + base verb.

### Examples:

If it rains tomorrow, we'll cancel the picnic.

If you study, you'll pass the exam.

If she calls, I'll answer.

If they arrive late, they'll miss the meeting.

If I find your book, I'll let you know.

If he trains harder, he'll win the race.

If we leave now, we'll catch the bus.

If you help me, I'll finish faster.

If they don't hurry, they'll be late.

If you eat healthy food, you'll feel better.

### 3. Second Conditional

Usage: Describes hypothetical or unreal situations in the present or future.

Structure: If + past simple, would + base verb.

#### Examples:

- If I were you, I would apologise.
- If she had more time, she would travel.
- If we won the lottery, we would buy a house.
- If he studied harder, he would pass the test.
- If they lived closer, we would visit them more often.
- If I knew French, I would apply for the job.
- If he drove carefully, he wouldn't have accidents.
- If it snowed in July, people would be surprised.
- If I had a car, I would drive to work.
- If she were taller, she would play basketball.

### 4. Third Conditional

Usage: Describes past situations that did not happen and their imagined outcomes.

Structure: If + past perfect, would have + past participle.

#### Examples:

- If I had studied, I would have passed the exam.
- If she had called, I would have answered.
- If we had left earlier, we would have caught the train.
- If they had invited us, we would have gone.
- If he had practised, he would have played better.
- If it had rained, the picnic would have been cancelled.
- If I had known, I would have helped.
- If they had worked harder, they would have succeeded.
- If she had seen the message, she would have replied.
- If he had been careful, he wouldn't have fallen.

### Table of Conditionals

Conditional	Usage	Structure	Example
Zero Conditional	General truths or facts	If + present simple, present simple	If you heat water, it boils.
First Conditional	Real or likely situations in the future	If + present simple, will + base verb	If it rains, we'll cancel the picnic.
Second Conditional	Hypothetical/unreal situations	If + past simple, would + base verb	If I had a car, I would drive to work.
Third Conditional	Imagined outcomes of past situations	If + past perfect, would have + past participle	If I had studied, I would have passed.
